Dr. C. Jean Mosley Hall has served as an Associate Professor in the Department of American Sign Language/Deaf Interpretive Services at Cuyahoga Community College (Tri-C®) since 1999.

Dr. Mosley Hall has more than 30 years experience in deaf education at multiple ages and education levels. Prior to joining Tri-C, she worked at institutions including Cleveland State University; Kent State University; Notre Dame College of Ohio; Case Western Reserve University; the Cleveland Hearing and Speech Center; Pennsylvania State University; New Jersey Commission for the Blind, Deaf; Margaret Sterck School for the Hearing Impaired; Western Maryland College; and the Newark School District Adult Education Office. She has also served as a consultant and American Sign Language interpreter for numerous organizations.

Dr. Mosley Hall also participates in several professional service activities including serving as a faculty mentor to those new to college-level teaching through Tri-C's faculty mentorship program; and mentoring students to enhance their social, educational and cultural arts experiences while at Tri-C through the Black Caucus. She also serves as advisor to Tri-C's American Sign Language Club. In 2000, she established the J. Paris Mosley Scholarship Fund of the Cleveland Foundation to support scholarships for deaf students' postsecondary education.

Dr. Mosley Hall is a member of numerous professional organizations including the Conference of Interpreter Trainers, Intertribal Deaf Council, Registry of Interpreters for the Deaf, Ohio Chapter of Registry of Interpreters for the Deaf, and Children of Deaf Adults (CODA).

Dr. Mosley Hall earned a bachelor's degree in business from Delaware State University (DE), a master's in deaf education from McDaniel College (MD), and a doctorate in education from Cleveland State University (OH).
