

Tri-C Responds to Basic Needs for Students: Fowler Family Student Success and Resource Fund

Hunger is growing on college campuses across the U.S.

Educators were already grappling with this crisis, especially at Tri-C where 43% of our students live in low-income households. In a recent survey, 18% of our students told us they skip meals regularly when they run out of money and 16% worry about having enough to eat. That was before the pandemic, which escalated the urgency. Today, help paying for food is a leading request to our emergency fund for students.

Thanks to a generous gift to the Tri-C Foundation, the College will be proactively prepared to help. The \$1,020,000 commitment from Char and Chuck Fowler is establishing the Fowler Family Student Success and Resource Fund, and creating space for The Pantry — A Tri-C Connect Initiative. The Metropolitan Campus site will stock fresh and frozen foods, dry goods, and essential toiletries in a comfortable and

accessible setting. Staff will help connect students to other campus resources to find long-term solutions. The pantry will open in Spring 2021.

Through their grant-making, the Fowlers focus on projects that address educational inequity, and seek to benefit individuals without resources who must overcome barriers to succeed in their educational goals. They have made addressing student hunger a high priority this year.

Tri-C student Frida Etchell is assisting in creating the graphic design concepts for the project. She is completing her Associate of Applied Business degree with a concentration in graphic design. Char Fowler commented, "Chuck and I were happy to work with the great team at Tri-C. Cleveland is fortunate to have this caring, quality college in our midst."

Community Responds to Support Public Safety Students

Family scholarship drive honors fallen firefighter



T-shirts intended to help a family heal have sparked a legacy that benefits aspiring firefighters at Tri-C. The Brett J. Wilson Fire Academy Scholarship Fund honors the fallen firefighter and Tri-C Fire Academy alumnus who passed away Oct. 30, 2019 while responding to a call.

Gifts from family, friends and colleagues created the fund, which fully supports two cadets as they complete the Tri-C Fire Training Academy. The family chose inspirational

language to describe the scholarship recipients, as "individuals who are born with the heart and determination to serve others in a selfless manner, who possess the innate passion for serving others in times of crisis

and the leadership to make a difference in the profession and in their community."

Bridging the Technology Gap for Students

Despite enhancements to Tri-C's online learning and support services that now run 24/7, we know many students still don't have reliable technology and internet access. Today's persistent digital divide continues to create barriers to online learning. In Cleveland, 30% of households — or 53,000 homes — have no broadband internet, according to the Federal Communications Commission.

Since spring 2020, the Tri-C Foundation's generous donors have helped Tri-C to provide more than 1,000 laptops, PCs, Wi-Fi "hot spots" and financial assistance so students can learn off-campus. The latest Student Laptop Program launched in the Fall 2020 semester. Donations to the Tri-C Foundation have allowed the College to offer new laptops to eligible students for just \$240, discounted by more than half. This is the latest

Scholarships 'Fortify' Nurse to Follow Career Dreams

Veronique Ramirez wanted to be a nurse, but she wasn't sure she could. Thanks to support, scholarships, and people believing in her, she earned her associate degree at Tri-C and became an RN in 2017. Her early doubts have faded as she continues to pursue her education and career.



"Once I got in the nursing program at Tri-C, I was fortified," she exclaimed. "I started looking at scholarships, and I found a mentor in (faculty member) Deniece Jukiewicz," she said. "All the support made me feel like, if I focused and buckled down, I could do this."

Multiple scholarships helped Ramirez complete the program. An Access Scholarship helped her transition from another education program. She received three awards from the Choose Ohio First program, plus funds through the Bernie Moreno Companies Scholarship, Hispanic Endowed Scholarship, a federal nursing grant, the Tri-C Foundation Nursing and Health Careers Scholarship, and the Frances Franklin Memorial Scholarship.

"If it wasn't for the scholarships, the mentoring and the support, I would have been overwhelmed," she said.

After graduating from Tri-C, she received a full scholarship through Northeast Ohio chapter of the National Association of Hispanic Nurses (NAHN) to earn her BSN online through the University of Alabama.

Now Ramirez is enrolled in Ohio University's DNP program while working as a trauma nurse at MetroHealth. The Warrensville Heights resident volunteers as a foster child mentor at Bellefaire. She is still involved in NAHN as chapter secretary and a mentor to two RN-to-BSN students. "I want to do my part to help others because so many people helped me," she explained. "I feel like I was meant for this. My mom and grandmother wanted to go into nursing but never had the opportunity. I want to succeed for them, and in their memory."

Gillespie Scholarship for Respiratory Therapy


The Dr. David Gillespie
