1. MMR Titers and Boosters

MMR Titer (Blood Test for Immunity)

- What it is: A blood test that checks for immunity against measles, mumps, and rubella, often needed for healthcare workers, international travel, or school entry.
- Without Insurance: The average cost is between \$50 to \$150, depending on the lab and location.
- With Insurance: Typically covered for individuals needing proof of immunity. Expect a co-pay of around \$10 \$50 based on your plan. If the test is not covered fully by your insurance, the full cost may apply until you reach your deductible.

MMR Booster Vaccine

- What it is: A booster dose to maintain immunity against measles, mumps, and rubella. Often recommended for adults without documented immunity.
- Without Insurance: Costs \$75 \$150 at most providers.

2. Varicella Titers and Boosters

14. Dental Exam with Radiographic Images (X-Rays)

Dental Exam
