The Westshore Research Collaborative (WRC) consists of a group of 15 individuals including full time and part time faculty, a tutor and two Deans. The focus of this learning community is to share ideas on how to engage in research at the college. Specifically, the WRC is interested in research on learning that we can incorporate into the classroom to increase student success.

Fall Activities

The WRC meets once per month to discuss topics related to research. In September, the first meeting was an ice-cream social and discussion on what the group's goal was going to be for the year. In October, the group invited the Director of Evidence and Inquiry, Rob Stuart, to present on how data collected at the college, can be used by faculty for research to promote student success. In November the group attended a webinar and Q&A by John Creswell, author of a numerous textbooks on mixed-methods research design. The final meeting of the semester, the group discussed the process of writing an internal review board (IRB) proposal at Tri-C.

Spring Activities

Spring meeting topics will include research design, research funding/grant writing, and best practices for student research assistants at a community college. The WRC will culminate the 2017/2018 year by holding a campus-wide faculty data blitz, where faculty are invited to present their most exciting research findings on learning and student success.
