



It is with great honor that we announce the recipient of Cuyahoga Community College's 2020 Student Veteran of the Year Award: Olivia Rodriguez.



Olivia is an outstanding student, an active community member and a passionate individual driven to meet her goals and better the world.

Academically, Olivia is meticulous about her studies and exhibits organizational and time management skills that set her apart from her peers. While at Tri-C, she was a member of Phi Theta Kappa and the Honors Program, and she served as president of the Westshore Campus Environmental Club. She graduated from

Tri-C with a 3.49 GPA and is now currently enrolled at Loyola University.

Olivia is committed to serving and bettering her community. She is a combat medic in the U.S. Army Reserves. She has helped those in need as a nationally registered EMT, and she earned the Army Achievement Medal for leadership during training. As a Tri-C student, Olivia was able to expertly manage her time and juggle the responsibilities of the U.S. Army alongside a full-time course load, as well as employment in the Stomp Café on campus. As a student leader, she launched textbook and book recycling programs as well as beach and water cleanups. She won the People's Choice Award for her participation in the Cleveland Metamorphosis Project, and she participated in the Case Western Reserve University Social Justice Teach-In this past February.

Olivia's most recent on-campus job was a work-study position funded by Veterans Affairs. VETERANS DAY

The 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month in 1918. The guns fell silent that day, putting an end to World War I.

Under President Woodrow Wilson, the United States had entered into a massive overseas mobilization, the likes of which had never before been attempted.

The Spanish Flu pandemic was still raging, but it was a time for celebration. Combat had ended, with the Entente powers victorious — thanks to the arrival of the United States.

One year later, President Wilson issued a message to his countrymen on the first Armistice Day, celebrating the solemn pride and heroism of those who had died in service of the nation. Armistice Day was celebrated on Nov. 11 of every year until 1954, when it was renamed Veterans Day. No apostrophe.

After all, this is not a day that belongs only to veterans. Unlike Memorial Day, this public holiday isn't just about thinking of the fallen. It celebrates the end of wartime. We acknowledge our gratitude for the sacrifices made by veterans and their families, as well as gratitude for the peace brought through their efforts.
